## - 2016 operating plan and budget approved -

The 2016 operating plan was the sole item on the agenda for the January 13 meeting of the Metropolitan Democrat Club of Seattle. On January 26 the finance committee met and prepared a draft budget to present at the January 27 meeting of the MDC. Both documents have been approved.

President Eleanor Munro compiled a list of goals drawn from a survey and the discussion by the members about the plan at the December 18 meeting.

#### The goals are:

- 1. Put on an absolutely smashing Diamond Jubilee, make money at it, and attract other progressives.
- 2. Increase income at our major events (Diamond Jubilee, Chautauqua Afternoon, and Winter Holiday Party).
- 3. Expand our promotional reach, improve quality of promotional activities.
- 4. Continue to put on fabulous bimonthly programs.
- 5. Involve more members in the activities of the organization.
- 6. Improve the Chautauqua; attract more

candidates; increase attendance.

- 7. Continue Winter Holiday Party; attract more candidates; increase attendance.
- 8. Take steps to increase diversity and outreach.
- 9. Improve the cohesiveness of the group; host evening socials.

## Consummate activist explains activism

"What is an activist?" Nick Licata asked members and guests of the Metropolitan Democratic Club of Seattle at its January 27 meeting. Although he sold and signed his latest book, Becoming A Citizen Activist -Stories, Strategies & Advice for Changing our World, that answers that question, he took the time to answer it in person.


Mr Licata was president of the MDC 1989 - 1993. He served five terms as a Seattle City Councilmember and in 2012 was awarded the designation Progressive Municipal Official of the Year by Nation. The Seattle Weekly twice named him Best Local Politician.

"Look around at your environment," he said. "Don't like what you see? Don't complain, change it. That's what an activist does."

You don't have to march in a parade or participate in a demonstration to be an activist, Mr Licata explained. You can write a letter or organize an opposition campaign.

There are several steps that activists need

to heed, he said. One is to recognize the need for allies. Another is to know where the power is. Yet another is learning how to get the word out – how to use the media. In stories and examples, Mr Licata demonstrated how to use each of these and other steps. Three examples of successful outcomes of activism were legalizing samesex marriage, raising the minimum wage to \$15, and legalizing the use of marijuana in Washington state.

Mr Redmond and Ms Hayashi will work on logistics.

Kathleen Flynn will coordinate the auction, working closely with Mr Howell and Ms Peggy Maze Johnson who will be soliciting items for both the live and silent auctions. All members of the MDC should begin to solicit for auction items.

10. Begin another issues group like the Health Care for All committee.

We also discussed the possibility of socializing with the legislative district leaders and holding quarterly socials.

Some of the work on these goals is underway; planning on others will begin soon.

#### **Programs**

As always, our most important activity is to organize top-notch programs in plenty of time to promote them for at least two or three months in advance.

There is never a shortage of ideas for programs. Our vice president will be kept busy arranging them and soliciting members to arrange them.

A survey indicated that the top two most popular topics are health care for all and Commissioner Peter Goldmark on impacts of global warming on the state Department of Natural Resources. The next two are Cherry Point/coal trains and global warming. These are followed by four more: immigration, what could US policy do to stabilize the Middle East, under-representation of people of color, and education. The final three toprated topics are: introduce newly elected city and county officials; racism, impacts, counteraction; and school-to-prison pipeline.

Other topics not on the list were suggested by members, including housing affordability, zoning changes and growth in Seattle (displacement, gentrification), SODO stadium, metropolitan parks, downtown school, South Lake Union library/fire station, and charter schools (why? why not?). I apologize if I missed any, but you can always propose a program to Vice President Jack Whisner.

Any member can organize a program (any of the above or something else entirely) with the approval of Mr Whisner and in accordance with the MDC program guidelines.

#### A real debate

One program that has been proposed is a proxy debate between candidates for president Hilary Clinton (Allan Munro) and Bernie Sanders (Lem Howell). This has not been authorized by either campaign as it is a private event. The MDC does not presume to speak on behalf of either the campaigns or the Democratic Party. The MDC is not part of the Party although it shares the Party's values. The event will take place

at the March 9 meeting in MDC's regular meeting place, Plaza 600 Building #205, 600 Stewart St.

A standard debate format or a slight variation will be used. Example:

- 1) affirmative constructive seven minutes
- 2) negative constructive seven minutes;
- 3) negative rebuttal five minutes, and
- 4) affirmative rebuttal five minutes.

There will be a designated time for members of the audience to question the debaters during the debate and participate in a discussion in the remaining time of the meeting.

Mr Howell and Mr Munro will flip a coin at the beginning. If Mr Howell calls it right, the debate will be entitled "Resolved: Bernie Sanders should be elected president of the United States." This puts him in the affirmative position. If he calls it wrong, the debate will be entitled "Resolved: Hilary Clinton should be elected president of the United States." In this case Mr Munro will have the affirmative position. Senator Pete Francis will be the moderator. The winner will be determined by vote of the audience.

### **Budget**

Treasurer Kate Martin called a meeting of the ad hoc finance committee to take place 7 pm at the home of Harriet Wasserman. The committee is typically made up of the executive committee and others appointed by the treasurer. Present were Treasurer Martin, Harriet Wasserman, Mark Marshall, Kiku Hayashi, and Eleanor Munro.

Ms Martin was called upon at the January 27 meeting to explain the conclusions of the committee and her budgetary policy. She described her strategy as being "more cautiously optimistic than last year." She distributed a historical review of MDC's finances going back through 2011. She also distributed a cash flow summary for the year 2015. This showed a deficit of \$2,783.91 and represents a corresponding reduction of MDC's reserves. An analysis demonstrates the deficit was mostly due to a decline in paid membership dues.

Ms Martin then distributed a budget proposal for 2016. She described this as a preliminary budget. Members asked specific questions about how realistic some of the line items entries are.

It is clear, Ms Martin said, that in this next year we need to increase the number of dues paying members, raise dues, and improve the profitability of our three major events for the year, Diamond Jubilee, Chautauqua and Winter Holiday Party, and reduce printing and postage costs.

It was moved and seconded to approve the budget. The motion passed.
