### **Godden presents** her biography

Jean Godden had hoped to use another title for her book – something on the order of "Memoirs of a Bad-Ass Bitch" - but the publisher decided it should be a little more socially acceptable, she explained to members and friends of the Metropolitan Demo-

cratic Club of Seattle at its March 25 meeting. They settled on "Citizen Jean: Riots, Rogues, Rumors and Other Inside Seattle Stories," which starts with a little-known Seattle and ends with Former Seattle City a Seattle that is defi- Councilmember nitely "on the map."

Ms Godden is a former Seattle City Councilmember and long-time member of the Metropolitan Democratic Club of Seattle. In her book, she said, she provides her experiences related to a variety of key historical Seattle events and personalities over the last 50+ years. For example, she added, she offers an overview of the efforts to stage a World's Fair and to save the Pike Place Market (once again), and to build the West Seattle Bridge.

During her presentation she related amusing stories about these and other events and about many of the people who were involved. She also described what it was like to be in the newsroom when various

### O'Brien: change land use codes to increase affordable housing

Changing Seattle's land use codes to allow accessory dwelling units (ADU) in single-family neighborhoods can mean increasing the availability of affordable housing, Seattle City Councilmember Mike O'Brien told members and friends of the Metropolitan Democratic Club of Seattle at its March 13 meeting.

In 2016 the Seattle City Council developed a proposal based on community input that would allow homeowners to build backyard and basement units. An environmental impact statement was completed in 2018 and is now before the City Hearing Examiner. A decision is expected in April. If the EIS is acceptable, there will be

more public input and Mr O'Brien expects "robust debate" on the issue.

Legislation as proposed in his preferred alternative in the final EIS, Mr O'Brien said would deal with issues such as size, height restrictions, off-street parking, owner occupancy, and number of units allowed in single-family zones. In addition it would address elements of design such as size, location of entries and roof features.

Mr O'Brien's policy objectives in promoting this proposal are to increase ADU production (both volume and variety) in single-family zones, support lower-and middle-income homeowners in developing ADUs, and increase access to ADUs for lower income renters.

If running for office again, he said, he'd run on this issue, as it represents reasonable regulation without radical change, "a politically safe issue."

Mr O'Brien, who represents District 6, was first elected to the Seattle City Council in 2010. He chairs the council's sustainability and transportation committee.

The MDC passed a resolution (see below) urging Representative Eileen Cody to hold hearings in the House Health and Wellness Committee on SB 5822 (passed by the Senate Wednesday, March 13), a bill that paves the way to use public funding to cover costs of health care services and products in Washington state.

Whereas the Washington State Senate has passed SB5822, which paves the way to use public funding to cover costs of health care services and products, without waiting for action to be taken by the United States Congress,

Therefore be it resolved that the Metropolitan Democratic Club of Seattle urges Representative Eileen Cody to promptly hold hearings and bring this measure to a vote in the House Health and

events broke, such as the resignation of President Richard Nixon.

The highpoints of her time on the Seattle City Council (2004 – 2016) and what she considers her major accomplishments, she said were passing the paid sick leave legislation for Seattle and the paid parental leave legislation for City of Seattle employees.

Ms Godden said her vision for the Seattle is that it will become a national leader in health care and climate change action.
